General context:

- emigration phenomenon in Brazil: a discontinuity in the history of an immigration country
- "migration transition" has more than a demographical significance: also social, political and identity-related
- new national perceptions of a country that is now mainly a land of departures, more than of arrivals
- similar perceptions may be found related to other Latin American countries

- > media information about emigrants abroad helps to disseminate this new image in Brazilian public opinion
- ➤ increasing awareness about Brazilian emigrants situation in reception countries > situations in common with other Latin American emigrants abroad
- consolidation of a Latin American (mainly South American) transnational migration territory, with border crossings and similar transcontinental emigration situations
- need to reconstruct traditional national images related to former situations in international migration context
- ➤ other transitional situations: former emigration countries (Spain, Portugal, Italy) which become immigration areas; traditional origin countries which turn to be transit and even destination areas (Morocco, Mexico)
